Probing into this young man's insight, Dwardu's Scoops found a mature mind who readily admitted that this change of attitude was due to a grow-



ing and increasingly nurtured maturity.

Budding ambition

Over time, attending various college activities, both formal and informal, Julian started observing the students who made it to College Captain before him. "I started saying I want to wear that uniform, I want to wear that tie," said Mr Coppini, acknowledging the first sparks of ambition within him. When he reached the middle of Year 11, he realised that this was it, crunch time. "I think I did my O Levels not to get into IB but to say that I had the chance of achieving the position of College Captain," affirmed Mr Coppini.



An all-night binge

There are, in student terms, owls and larks. Owls are those who study at night. Larks are those who rise early to finish their work. Mr Coppini smiled when he recalled the email sent by the head of the IB Diploma, Mr Jolen Galea. Received late in the evening, Mr Galea himself being an owl, Mr Coppini reacted immediately: "The first thing I said was 'I'm not sleeping, I'm writing this thing," and so he did, pulling an allnighter.

Changing attitudes

Impressive, observed **Dwardu's Scoops**, but what was the young man with aspirations to wear the Captain's tie aiming to do once he became head honcho of the student body? "I have seen the evolution of the college over the years, and it is my second home. As I want the best for my first home, so too, I want the Col-

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lege to be the best. I want to give the students a voice," said Mr Coppini. Having been at the college since as far back as memory can take him, Mr Coppini said that he has a good idea of how the college works, how and what can change and where to improve. Challenged on what needs to change, Mr Coppini was clear:" What needs to change is less from the academic side and more on the facilities side as well as the students' attitude to the college...that certainly needs to be fixed, "said Julian Coppini. School, he emphasised is not about "Oh, I got a 90 in Biology and my brain is absolutely massive" but rather that school is about living the moment within the community. Expanding on the subject, Mr Coppini said that as College Captain he gets to attend all the formal events of the school and hence he plans to attempt attitudinal change through leading by example and sharing perspectives.





On Leadership

Mr Coppini defined leadership through an analogy involving rockclimbing. "I think that leadership is someone who reaches the to and does not keep on going on their own but helps others to reach the top themselves," observed Mr Coppini. He praised the college as having given him and his colleagues a strong selfconcept and clear life vision. "I did not miss out at all in my social development and the college has given me a strong sense of brotherhood with my friends," said the College Captain.





On the future

"In five or ten years, considering that I would like to go down the line of medicine, I would hope to be in a hospital and I would be saving lives," replied Mr Coppini when asked where he sees himself in the future. He is clear in his career path: Mr Coppini wants to go into cardio-thoracic surgery. "Ultimately, I want to save lives, I want to give people the opportunity to go back to their loved ones for another day. I want to put all the years of learning and all the effort it took into saving lives". But why saving lives, asked **Dwardu's Scoops.** "I think there are two major contributions which can be

made by humanity: help the species evolve or help to prolong its life. I choose the latter path. I want to be in the most gruesome, abnormal and complicated situations where knowledge makes a difference between life and death" explained Mr Coppini. "In my eyes there are no lives worth saving more than others. Even if I had my worst enemy bleeding out before me, I would save them anyway because lives matter. The concept of saving a life means that that person has been given an extension on their possibilities," concluded Mr Coppini.

I could not help smiling as I concluded this interview and later as I sat down to write this piece. The answers given by the new College Captain indicate a maturity far beyond the age of the person. And yet, it also betrays a refreshing idealism, as yet untainted by the vicissitudes of life. We wish Mr Coppini well and we shall keep our eye on him and his future exploits.
