Between Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> and Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> December, many St Edward's Middle School students took part in a Crib Making activity which took place in the History and Art room.

To create the mixture for the crib we mixed water and plaster, in Maltese 'gibs vergni', to create a very sticky mixture that hardens quite fast. We then crumbled up big pieces of paper, that we recycled and dipped them slowly in the mixture and placed them neatly on the wooden base in the form of a cave. Using other pieces of wood, it helped us to keep the cave standing and not collapse with the weight of the plaster. Within a few minutes, the

paper hardened and we began to brush the structure with coloured powder mixed with water. We left the crib to dry for a day. The result looked extremely realistic, but the paint was still slightly wet. Therefore, we covered the whole structure with varnish coating. The following day we placed the small religious figurines inside and around the cave and decorated it with some soil and other natural props.

The Crib was finally complete.
